

Star Trek actor's ashes heading to space this month 12:45 p.m. EDT, April 2, 2007



LAS CRUCES, New Mexico (AP) — The ashes of James Doohan, who played chief engineer Montgomery "Scotty" Scott on the original *Star Trek* TV series, have been loaded into a rocket that is set to launch in New Mexico later this month.

The remains of Doohan, Mercury astronaut Gordon Cooper and some 200 others were loaded into the rocket Friday by Charles Chafer, chief executive of Celestis, a Texas company that contracts with rocket firms to send cremated remains into space.

"And we're ready to go," Chafer said after inserting the silver canister.

Jerry Larson, president of Connecticutbased UP Aerospace Inc., said the rocket will be launched April 28.

Families paid \$495 to have a few grams of their loved one's ashes placed on the rocket.

Chafer said he's aware of the dedication of *Star Trek* fans.

"There's no doubt that we'll find a way to accommodate fans who travel here and

want to be part of that experience," he said.

Doohan died in July 2005 at age 85.

The remains of *Star Trek* creator Gene Roddenberry were blasted into space in 1997.

Abrams Talks about Directorial Decision

J.J. Abrams, the producer of "Star Trek XI" who recently signed with Paramount to also direct, has been talking about the project in a variety of forums, basically saying that after he read the completed script by Alex Kurtzman and Roberto Orci, it was so outstanding he couldn't not direct it.

Abrams spoke March 2 at the Cinequest Film Festival in San Jose, Calif., and then last Friday, March 9, at the Technology, Entertainment and Design (TED) Conference in Monterey, Calif. He also visited with Wired magazine for an interview that was published last week.

In each case his talks encompassed a range of topics, and the "Star Trek" project was only a small part of each one, if mentioned at all. The reason: "If I talk about this movie, everyone else who is involved with it knows where I live and will use that and, er, kill me," he joked at Cinequest.

However, he told the festival audience, "I can say that when the script came in it was so well written, it was so emotional, it was fun and big and I found myself unable to not direct it!"

Double negatives notwithstanding, he

continued, "I couldn't give it up. I think it's going to be great. If in my gut I felt there was nothing else to offer, I wouldn't do it. It's not a business decision; I would rather take no money and do something inspiring. I hope it ends up being both a really cool, original, emotional ride and comes from something that we're familiar with."

In the Wired article Abrams said something similar: "I'd feel like an idiot if I let someone else (direct) it." He also reiterated, "It's a little too early to talk about Star Trek, but I can't tell you how excited I am to do that (project). I'm thrilled."

He said the script is "clearly a fun, emotional and wild adventure," and he couldn't turn down the chance to take the helm. "This is going to be an incredibly fun movie. I can't believe that they're letting us do this," he exclaimed.

He also mentioned, without being specific, that he is getting input for the project from the "science/geek community," as the magazine put it. "I get the use of brilliant minds and futurists and people who are thinking these things through," Abrams said vaguely. "We'd be crazy not to take advantage of the information coming to us."

Also, he hopes to help Star Trek gaming reach its potential. "I love good games," he said, but added that games based on existing properties typically "falter because they're relying on the title and the name recognition instead of relying on game-play and story and content. So I feel like the ideal ... is when form and function come together. We definitely have the form, and the function needs to be better."


He's also supportive of the "fan film" phenomenon in the Star Trek community, and has viewed some of the made-for-the-Web productions. "I've seen some that

are done with incredible passion and are really impressive. I love seeing anything that is created by anyone who is not doing it in a pre-existing system where resources and tools are available — the idea that someone is out there using off-the-shelf 3D software or, especially, software that is made by the entrepreneurial coder, who's out there creating their own software. I'm always making stuff, so the idea of people doing that is my favorite thing in the world. I love it."

At the TED Conference, Abrams apparently did not talk about "Star Trek" directly (per the blogs we've seen), but discoursed more generally about "mystery" in storytelling. In his presentation, he brought to the stage a wooden "Mystery Box" that he bought as a kid from a magic store in New York, a box with a big question mark printed on it. He has never opened that box and said he never will. "What I love about this box is that I find myself drawn to infinite possibility. Mystery is the catalyst for imagination. In my work, mystery boxes are everywhere." To illustrate his point, he said that "Jaws" and "Alien" were more compelling by the fact that we hardly ever saw the creature in each case.

U.S. Billionaire Heads to Space Station

BAIKONUR, Kazakhstan (AP) - A Russian rocket carrying the American billionaire who helped develop Microsoft Word roared into the night skies over Kazakhstan Saturday, sending Charles Simonyi and two cosmonauts soaring into orbit on a two-day journey to the international space station.

Climbing on a column of smoke and fire into the clouds over the bleak steppes, the Soyuz TMA-10 capsule lifted off at 11:31 p.m. local time, casting an orange glow over the Baikonur cosmodrome and dozens of officials and well-wishers watching from about a mile away.

The capsule turned northeast and moved downrange before entering orbit about 10 minutes later. It was scheduled to rendezvous with the station Monday.

Among those bidding farewell was Simonyi's friend Martha Stewart, who watched the launch from a location separate from other spectators.

After seeing Simonyi off for final preparations, Stewart spent the final hours before the launch aboard another mode of transportation common to this part of Kazakhstan's steppes - a camel.

"The ride was excellent," she said.

Inside the capsule, Simonyi and cosmonauts Fyodor Yurchikhin and Oleg Kotov grinned for the onboard camera, gave the thumbs-up sign and batted at a toy black cat hanging from rope -- a token of good luck chosen by Kotov and named after his two children.

Simonyi, a 58-year-old native of Hungary, paid \$25 million for the 13-day trip, the fifth such paying "space tourist," or "space flight participant," as officials prefer to call

them.

"I think for Charles it is a dream come true," said Victoria Scott, a friend who watched the liftoff as others drank champagne toasts and chanted "Charles! Charles!"

In a posting on the blog he intends to maintain while in orbit, Simonyi said he spent his final day getting a haircut and a therapeutic massage and watched a traditional showing of a classic Soviet-era war film.

There was no mention of Stewart on the blog, but Simonyi did make reference to one of the lesser-known, last-minute traditions for cosmonauts heading into space -- urinating on the tire of the bus transporting them to the launch-pad.

Three days after arriving at the station and greeting its current occupants — Russian cosmonaut Mikhail Tyurin and American astronauts Miguel Lopez-Alegria and Sunita Williams — Simonyi will treat the crews to a gourmet meal, chosen by Stewart, in honor of Cosmonauts' Day, the Russian day commemorating Yuri Gagarin's historic 1961 flight into space.

The menu includes quail roasted in Madiran wine, duck breast confit with capers, shredded chicken parmentier, apple fondant pieces, rice pudding with candied fruit, and semolina cake with dried apricots.

Simonyi had said he would bring with him the paper computer tapes that he used decades ago when he first learned programming on a bulky Soviet machine called Ural-2. He emigrated to the United States in 1968 and eventually worked at Microsoft Corp. (MSFT), helping to develop Word and Microsoft Excel before founding his own software company.

While at the space station, Simonyi will be conducting a number of experiments, including measuring radiation levels and studying biological organisms inside the lab.

He is to return to Earth on April 20 along with Tyurin and Lopez-Alegria.

PRIVATE ENTERPRISE GOES TO SPACE

In what could bring private business one step closer to space, Space Exploration Technologies launched it's Falcon 1 rocket from the Kwajalein Atoll launch site in the Pacific Ocean. The rocket was carrying a one hundred and ten pound (fifty kilogram) set of experiments, including an automated flight safety system, low-cost satellite communications transceiver, and mechanical payload adapter ring.

The rocket was scheduled to launch at 7pm Eastern Daylight Time, but due to several problems, which included a payload communications problem, and one pad abort (just one second before lift-off,) the launch was aborted while they checked out the malfunctions. Then, in what would have done NASA engineers of the 1970's proud, the problems were resolved and the Falcon rocket was launched at 9:10pm, Eastern daylight time. (Well within the 4 hour deadline.)

The first stage was an unmitigated success and broke away, leaving the second stage to climb space wards. Sadly, however, there was a malfunction in the second stage, which resulted in a roll that most likely sent the payload stage on a path that re-entered the earth's atmosphere somewhere over the Pacific Ocean, without completing a full orbit.

According to the Space Exploration Technologies spokesperson, the mission is considered a success, instead of a failure, since they did technically reach space. At the time of the malfunction, telemetry showed the Falcon-1 to be at an altitude of one hundred and ten miles, which is just fifty miles below the International Space Station. He also stated that

only a full review of the mission logs and camera footage would show how the malfunction occurred.

This is the second attempt for Space Exploration Technologies in trying to reach space. Their first Falcon 1 rocket exploded on lift-off on March 24, 2006 and was later determined to be the result of a corroded aluminum nut on the fuel tank.

It should be noted that Space Exploration Technologies could have launched another rocket within six months of the first failure, but waited for the upgrades to their launching facility and gave them a chance to put the Falcon 1 Mark 2 to the test.

The sixty-eight foot tall rocket has two sections that allow it to boost satellite payloads of one thousand two hundred and fifty-six pounds into low and medium earth orbits. The first section is detachable and like rockets of the past, uses parachutes to lower it into the ocean, where the company can retrieve it for later use.

Despite the failure of this payload to stay in space for one full orbit, Space Exploration Technologies plans to launch two more rockets, one set for June, which will orbit the Navy Research Lab's TacSat1, and the second which has an undetermined date, which will launch the Razaksat Earth-observation satellite.

The Falcon 1 is to be the direct precursor of the Falcon 9, which is slated to be the rocket that will launch the company's re-usable Dragon Spacecraft.
