How old were you when you discovered *Star Trek*? I was 7 and watched it on a brand new color TV in 1967 but I really started getting into it with reruns in the 1970s. I've been a teacher for 15 years now and still find ways to expose Trek to new generations - and try to convince them that *Star Trek* beats *Star Wars* anyday!

We recently had our last school day. It's traditional for teachers to have it as a fun, calm day to pass out any papers, clean out lockers, and show a movie. As part of their cultural heritage, I expose my elementary students to *Star Trek* throughout the year. They hear lots of phrases; from "warp speed," to "shields," to "Is that logical?" They know that it isn't anything weird, its part of my personality, and it's part of their history as Americans. I don't overdo it, but they know it's an interest of mine.

This year on the last day of class, I treated my students to two episodes from TOS. I picked out two I thought they would enjoy ("Miri" and "Arena"). I set up the shows first, showed the episodes and then we discussed the main points and characters. The kids watched the shows with incredible attention and I realized that they hadn't seen them before. Can you imagine growing up without Captain Kirk, Spock, or Dr. McCov as heroes or even knowing the wonderful drama and adventure of this piece of television history? One student came up to me and said, "I get what the colors [of the uniforms] stand for: the yellow is for captains, the blue is for scientists, and the red is for the police." Not bad for a 9 year old's view of a television series that was filmed 30 years before he was born and 4 subsequent series ago.

As we grow older, keep in mind the characters and episodes of the various se-

ries that you enjoyed. If you can, share them with others of younger generations. We may have to be the ambassadors of Trek for awhile, until the next series comes out. If we share what originally excited us about the show, we might be able to "pass the tricorder" on to another generation - the Next Generation.

War. It's a small word, but one with a big impact. It's a path to victory and a path to defeat. "Close Assault: 1944" which featured weapons and tactical demonstrations as well as a brief but informative history throughout the years of World War I and World War II.

Visitors who attend are treated to a variety of demonstrations that included American, German, and Japanese weapons, as well as a bit of show-and-tell of their uniforms. In one case, a young volunteer was shown first hand the amount of equipment that a soldier might be typically required to carry into battle. One thing is always stressed throughout the demonstrations: that war is not a good thing, that it's a nasty business. But it may be necessary at times. This is what

G Company excels at, that it's not just to recreate a battle, but to remember what it was like 65 years ago during a war that might have had a different outcome were some circumstances changed.

To this effect, they recreated a battle of the Sigfried Line which is on the German border during WW2. A German machine gun nest was the target of the infantry. An M4 Sherman tank, all 35 tons of it, was used in the demonstration of this battle, and one round was fired. Even though blank rounds were used, the loud explosion from this heavy vehicle is enormous, but the real thing would have been far louder. A "Half-track" vehicle was also used. The entire battle lasted about 7

minutes, but I daresay in reality's history, it might have been longer than that. In the movies, we see some battles that last for a few minutes in a scene, but some battles will last for days in real life with absolutely no idea as to the out-

come.

By seeing this demonstration, one can appreciate in a small way what our soldiers of all branches must have gone through during World War II and any other battle as service to our nation. Seeing this recreation on this Memorial Day weekend was one way of honoring those servicemen and women who fought for our country's freedom. As someone once said, "Freedom isn't Free." It never has been, and it never will be.

A Financial Matter Facing STARFLEET

Good evening, STARFLEET! I'm writing on behalf of Commander, STARFLEET FADM Les Rickard and Chief Financial Officer COMM Liz Woolf and the rest of the EC, to inform the membership of an issue that has arisen.

Last weekend, at the STARFLEET Region 3 Summit in Dallas, a woman asked to meet with Liz and R3 RC Brad Pense. who were joined by the other members of the EC who were on hand, and identified herself as an Enforcement Officer for the Texas State Comptroller's office. She informed us that they had received an anonymous tip into their Austin headquarters about the event and that STARFLEET and Region 3 might not be in compliance with tax law.

The Sales Tax Issue

A meeting was held with the enforcement officer, the aforementioned EC members. CS Chief of Staff Greg Trotter, Region 3 Regional Coordinator Brad Pense, and at times, Pat Spillers, former CFO, former Quartermaster, and the chair of the 2005 STARFLEET International Conference (which was held in Texas).

She brought to our attention that Texas state law requires collecting and remitting sales tax for merchandise, Summit registrations, banquet fees, and charity auction sales. In addition, she informed us that in Texas, memberships are taxable if processed in Texas for Texas residents who submit memberships by mail. (Internet-purchased memberships, and memberships for those in other states. aren't taxable.)

Also, STARFLEET Quartermaster sales were handled in Texas by Pat Spillers for some time, so all Quartermaster sales to

Texas residents during Pat's tenure are | Task Force subject to Texas sales tax. STARFLEET's 1998 and 2005 International Conferences, both of which occurred in Texas, also came up.

Though I was traveling on Saturday afternoon en route to California for work, Greg and Liz reached me and briefed me on the situation. We have since informed Les and the rest of the EC, and the Admiralty Board, and have had a few valuable discussions on the subject.

What's Next?

Our first order of business shall be to open a dialogue with the state to clarify our responsibilities and any liabilities. The Texas Comptroller's office is offering amnesty through August 15, 2007 for remedy of past-due taxes. Thus, if we can have any amount due paid by that date, we should be able to pay no penalties or interest on our late filings. We plan to work with a Texas-based CPA or tax attorney to assist us with this task.

In addition, we'll have to determine the sales tax equirements for all states in which we do business. For example, in New Jersey memberships are not taxable, nor are items of clothing. Because Liz is an officer of the corporation and resides in New Jersey, however, we may be considered to be "doing business" within the state, and it is likely that nonclothing Quartermaster purchases are taxable to New Jersey residents, regardless of how they are ordered. These determinations will have to be made in every state in which STARFLEET operates especially those housing operations centers (such as Membership Processing or the Quartermaster) or those in which corporate officers reside.

The events of this weekend also bring into question the tax status of our International Conferences. We will be working with IC'07 organizers to communicate with the State of Colorado, and most likely, STARFLEET will obtain a "special event" sales tax ID in Colorado for the IC.

To deal with these many questions we have established a task force of knowledgeable STARFLEET members who are willing to do the leg work and research to help STARFLEET come into compliance with these regulations. The task force will be run by Steve Halber, and will include Brad Pense, Tammy Wilcox, Chrissy Killian, Emmett Plant, and Liz Woolf.

My thanks to these folks for agreeing to share their time and expertise with STARFLEET as we figure this out. While we don't plan to expand the task force. please let Liz or me know privately if you have specific expertise or knowledge pertaining to the relevant sales tax laws in your state.

What Should YOU Do?

We have asked the STARFLEET and SFMC Quartermasters to stop selling merchandise until the sales tax requirements facing them can be clarified. Liz and I would caution all regions and chapters to be very careful in selling merchandise or collecting funds for any reason until we have some more answers. Our suggestion is that you cease all sales and other activities involving taking in funds until the situation can be clarified. (Note that sales via separate organizations such as CafePress can continue; they are selling the merchandise, not you, and they're responsible for collecting sales tax as needed.)

STARFLEET will continue to process memberships. We believe we have a pretty good grasp of how this affects us.

Staying Focused

It's very important that STARFLEET act and speak with one voice in this matter. Please DO NOT contact authorities in vour state on STARFLEET's behalf, and please DO NOT contact the Texas Comptroller's office to request more info. Please DO NOT begin your own inquiry

WITCH HUNTS

Good afternoon, friends. I'm saddened and stunned to have learned that a member of STARFLEET has called the Comptroller's Office of the State of Texas, and told them that we have formed a task force to find out who initiated the original sales tax complaint that I outlined to you a week and a half ago. These dire insinuations of a witch hunt could not be further from the truth.

As everyone here knows, STARFLEET's Chief Financial Officer has formed a task force of volunteers willing to give of their time to help STARFLEET come to a clear understanding of its obligations to Texas and to other states in which we do business, so that we may be more fully compliant with sales tax laws in the future. This task force has absolutely no mission to determine who initially raised this issue, and there is no other task force with that mission.

We have no interest in finding out who originally reported STARFLEET's unwitting lack of compliance to the State of Texas, and I don't even want to worry about who placed the more recent call with baseless allegations of STARFLEET's non-existent plans for retaliation. This isn't something we have the time or energy to worry about, and that's not how STARFLEET operates, anyway.

STARFLEET is not interested in finding or punishing the person or persons who have contacted the State of Texas to report the true information that we were not meeting our obligations with regard to sales tax in Texas, or the untrue and hurtful disinformation that there is a Fleet-sanctioned witch hunt.

If the person or persons responsible are reading this message, I would urge you to find something better to do with your time than lying to a state agency to raise a false specter of conspiracy.

A Further Note from FADM Les Rickard, Commander, STARFLEET

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Let me be clear on one thing regarding any perceived or actual "witch hunts" into who, what, why and etc on the report to the Texas State Comptrollers Office.

There will be none sanctioned by Fleet anywhere, at any level at any time.

We are moving forward with fixing a problem we have. Regardless of the method, intentions or otherwise we will not retaliate in any way. We will fix the problem and move forward...a better Fleet.

I hope that is plain and clear enough for everyone.

into these matters.

We expect to be able to provide information that will help individual STARFLEET chapters and other subgroups of the organization to determine what their responsibilities are with regard to sales tax. If we're not able to provide information relevant to you, we'll encourage you to contact your local authorities solely for your own local needs.

While some of the reactions I've heard this week have tended towards shock or dismay at the realization that someone, presumably within STARFLEET, reported this issue to the State of Texas rather than attempting to bring it up within the chain of command. I must urge all of you to remember that, while that might have been a preferable approach, it's still something that simply needs to be addressed. The important thing is to determine the right thing to do to fulfill our legal obligations to Texas and the other states we operate in, protect STARFLEET, and ensure there is a club to go on. Yes, this could sharply affect our finances, but we will survive this and continue.

Comics Boldly Returning To Original Five Year Mission

Comic writer David Tischman is working on completing the original Enterprise's five-year mission, though he said he wonders whether *Star Trek: Year Four*, which will be published in July, might be his own personal Kobayashi Maru.

"The Kobayashi Maru is a test Starfleet cadets take, a no-win situation. It's a test of character," Tischman explained to Comic Book Resources. "I'm working hard - and the writing's been harder than I expected - but I think the stories are better because of the extra work."

Tischman recently completed the miniseries Star Trek: The Next Generation: The Space Between for IDW Publishing, which has posted images from the sixth and last comic book in the set. But he remains focused on Kirk, Spock and McCoy. "Kirk is the ultimate adventurer. He's Tom Sawyer and

Buck Rogers and Allen Quartermain all wrapped up in one...Spock is the adolescent geek in all of us. Too smart for his own good...[McCoy] lets his emotions guide his conscience. It's a good lesson "more people should listen to it."

Though he considers "A Piece of the Action" and "The Cloud Minders" to be must-see episodes, "Balance of Terror" is Tischman's favourite. "I actually have a huge fondness for the lesser-used characters," he said. "Nurse Chapel and Commanders Kyle and Riley." As far as the



films go, "Star Trek II is my favorite...I still believe Montalban should have been nominated for Best Supporting Actor" Unfortunately, he will not have an opportunity to write any Khan stories for the miniseries.

Tischman believes that comics "allow these fan-favorite franchises to live on, to explore the worlds created in TV and movies and to add to the existing universes." He is also writing a comic for Vertigo and for Moonstone he will adapt *Johnny Dollar*, based on a 1950s radio drama.

STAR TREK FLAT SOLD ON E3AY

Tony Alleyne, the Star Trek fan who turned his flat into a replica of

a Star Trek ship has sold it.

Alleyne, 54, spent two years and £30,000 turning his one-bed studio flat in Hinckley, Leicestershire, into a detailed copy of the starship *Voyager's* flight deck.

He put his flat up for sale on internet auction site eBay a month ago with a guide price of £130,000 - £50,000. It sold for five times that amount -- £425,000 -- when five fellow Trekkies began a bidding war.

The winning bid was made by a millionaire Birmingham businessman.

Mr. Alleyne started work on the flat two years ago after his marriage broke down.

The flat has molded wall panels, blue lighting and a "transporter room".

Last February Mr. Alleyne filed for bankruptcy after running up debts of £166,000.

He spent more than £30,000 converting the flat as well as £100,000 on marketing his firm, 24th Century Interior Designs.

But, despite going bankrupt, he refit the flat using income support payments.



Terminator Will Be Back, Without Arnold

Los Angeles (E! Online) - The Terminator is making good on its coming-back word. The Governator, not so much.

The Halcyon Company has announced plans to revive the cyborg-battling movie series with at least three more films, after the production company purchased all rights to the dormant franchise for an undisclosed, though likely eight-figure, sum.

But while Halcyon founders Victor Kubicek and Derek Anderson are looking to begin preproduction on Terminator 4 as soon as possible, they will do so without a leading man. Or man-machine.

Plot details for the fourth film have been kept under tight wraps, though are said to pick up with John Connor, heir to the rebellion, in his thirties, leading the remainder of the human race in its everworsening battle against the machines. As the film will mark the beginning of a new trilogy, rather than a continuation of the previous three installments, its unlikely that the Terminator himself, Arnold Schwarzenegger, will even take part in the film reinvention, other than perhaps a cameo.

Of course, there are other reasons why the Ah-nuld won't be featured on the big screen. He has a bit of a schedule conflict due to matters of a more gubernatorial nature.

T4 has already been fast-tracked for production, with Halcyon looking to get the installment in theaters by summer 2009. As it is, Schwarzenegger will be leading the state of California through 2011.

While a spokeswoman for the governor asserts that "no law says he couldn't" star

in the reimagined flick if he wanted to, the project was nonetheless "not even on his radar."

new minders aren't worried about extending the brand beyond Arnie.

"With T3, we included many incidental details and plot points that, along with the ain narrative, set the stage for an entirely new set of inter-related stories covering the future adventures of John Connor and the Terminators," producer Moritz Borman said. "This new Terminator trilogy will build upon the already huge worldwide Terminator fan base, which was both revitalized and expanded with the global success of T3."

In fact, T3, along with T2 and, well, plain old T, have grossed just over \$1 billion worldwide since Terminator was first released in 1984.

"The Terminator franchise represents by far the most popular and successful franchise not owned by a major studio," Kubicek said. "We see this global franchise as a cornerstone of Halcyon's future business plans."

In addition to the big-screen cyborg saga, the company snapped up all future merchandising and licensing rights to the franchise, future revenue generated by T3: Rise of the Machines and a portion of the rights to an almost guaranteed TV series based on the films.

Warned Bros. has already filmed a pilot for The Sarah Connor Chronicles, an hour-long show based around the Terminator character and mythology surrounding the movies. According to Variety, Fox has already expressed interest in the project, and could opt to pick up the series at next week's up fronts, when the fall prime-time schedules are unveiled.

STAR TREK'S SCOTTY'S ASHES LOST & FOUND

After a three-week search, they found the rocket that had carried ashes of "Star Trek" actor James Doohan briefly into space.

The remains of Doohan, whose "Star Trek" character Scotty inspired the television catch phrase "Beam me up, Scotty," were blasted off to the edge of space from New Mexico on April 29, two years after his death at the age of 85.

The payload also included ashes of astronaut Gordon Cooper, who first went into space in 1963, and another 200 people.

But the UP Aerospace Spaceloft XL rocket carrying the capsules with the ashes back to Earth got lost in rugged terrain and the search for it was hampered by bad weather.

"Now we can all say 'mission accomplished," Rick Homans, executive director of New Mexico's Spaceport Authority, said on Friday.

Organizers said the rocket and the individual capsules containing the ashes were in good condition and would be mounted on plaques and returned to the families.

Canadian-born Doohan played the starship Enterprise's chief engineer Montgomery Scott in the original 1966-1969 "Star Trek" television series.

GEOCACHING

Hi. My name is Ronin's Gal (aka Heather Ford), and I'm a Geocacher.

OK, I've admitted it, and that's half the battle to overcoming the addiction. Or not! I blame Doug Hogan. He sent to the list a while back a link to a really cool geocoin showing the Enterprise on it. I had already heard of geocaching before, having seen an article on the "Fit for Friday" segment that News 8 Austin does. But looking at all the geocoins on that site made me remember how fun this game really sounded! So I had to check it out. Then I informed Raymond that he was

buying me a GPS unit for our anniversary. (I think I got him a computer game. Doesn't seem very equitable, does it?)


First off, this is a game. The game started May 3, 2000, with the hiding of a black bucket containing some videotapes, etc., in the woods near Beaver Creek. Or-

egon. It is, specifically, a high-tech scavenger hunt using a GPS unit to lead you to the latitude and longitude of the cache you are hoping to find. The game is a world-wide adventure, so you can keep playing on your summer vacation, winter ski trip, family reunion, etc. I even played on my way up to Summit. Raymond patiently waited in the car with Grace (aka Ronin's Ayame, who only plays when the mood strikes her), while I lifted lamp skirts in the parking lot of the Hilton Garden Inn in Temple. The cache was called "Paris' Home Away From Home," and I left a geocoin there that I had picked up in Round Rock 2 weeks before. If I ever get to Japan to meet some of Raymond's family, I'm gonna hunt down the cache near Fukuoka airport.

Are there always prizes? No. Not all

caches are created the same. Many of the "park and grab" caches, such as the one I just mentioned, are nothing but a 35mm film canister or an Altoids tin with paper in it for logging your visit. Others, such as one called "Bedrock" in Round Rock's Old Settler's park, are larger, much more elaborately hidden caches, and capable of holding trade items a small notebook for logging your visit, and a pen. This was the first physical cache Grace and I found. She traded out a stretchy green alien toy that we brought along for a ring left by a previous visitor. Some caches have themes - "Have a Ball, Y'all", also in Old Settler's Park (we haven't found this one yet - it's on a creek bank in a forested area of the park), is for trading out bouncy balls. One in Bryan has a theme of Saturday morning cartoon characters, and was launched with, among

other things, comic books inside. Often, caches like these will often become the temporary homes of the geocoins mentioned above, or travel bugs also called hitchikers items which have trackable dog tags attached to them and which have a mission all their own. A great example of this is one that



There are also "virtual" caches - usually involving historical markers. A great way to learn a little local history. Grace and I have checked out 3 so far, and downtown Austin is just loaded with these. Some-

times the regular caches will teach you something, too. Anybody know from where TAMU recruited it's first professors? Look up the information on the cache "TMI Castle" (located in Austin), and find out.

So, sound interesting? There are a few rules, the first and foremost being GET PERMISSION BEFORE PLACING A CACHE ON PRIVATE PROPERTY!! We don't want anyone shot or arrested. Following closely is rule number two, do NOT

place a cache in a location or in a manner in which the cache could be misconstrued as a bomb! (Corollary: Ammo, knives, drugs, etc., are not appropriate trade items - geocaching is child-friendly sport). You all probably remember the recent problem Cartoon Network had with their Aqua

Team: Hunger Force ad placements up north. There is even a town in New Jersey that has an ordinance against geocaching because of the confusion a poorly-placed cache can cause. That said, the McDonald's in Hutto has a cache in its drive-thru, in plain site of the surveillance cameras, and all with the permission (and to the great amusement) of the management. They are becoming accustomed to grown men, often in groups of two or three, skulking around their drive-thru at 3 AM. Which is because of another rule - try to avoid the muggles. Yes, that's right. You, reading this right now, with the known exceptions of Doug Hogan and Ed Dravecky, are muggles, and we aren't really supposed to do this stuff in front of you, out of fear that you will come up afterwards and mess with the cache (or get paranoid and call the cops on us!). Muggles often do find these accidentally, though, so if you ever do run across one, feel free to sign the log, and then please place it back exactly as you | Houston - 2,417 caches

found it.

Don't have a GPS unit? Check out your local Craig's List. I've seen them for as low as \$40, with software (for loading/ tracking waypoints from your computer to the unit). Worried about using up a lot of gasoline? The caches are all around you (like the one near my favorite Freebirds in Austin's Hancock Center). Don't have a lot of spare time? I've been doing this since March, and only have 17 finds so far. Some folks have thousands. But then, some folks pay for pager notifications and go running off at 1 AM to try

> and be "First to Find." I'm not that competitive. And you don't have to be, either. I still haven't found that one at the McDonald's (not for lack of trying, but for lack of height, I suspect), and I only live 0.7 miles from it. Last excuse - what if there aren't any in my town? Non-A quick sense. glance at some cities

around R3 reveal[search limit is for all caches within a 50 mile radius]:



NASA MARS ROVER READY FOR DESCENT INTO CRATER

WASHINGTON - NASA's Mars rover Opportunity is scheduled to begin a descent down a rock-paved slope into the Red Planet's massive Victoria Crater. This latest trek carries real risk for the long-lived robotic explorer, but NASA and the Mars Rover science team expect it to provide valuable science.

Opportunity already has been exploring layered rocks in cliffs around Victoria Crater. The team has planned the descent carefully to enable an eventual exit, but Opportunity could become trapped inside the crater or lose some capabilities. The rover has operated more than 12 times longer than its originally intended 90 days.

The scientific allure is the chance to examine and investigate the compositions and textures of exposed materials in the crater's depths for clues about ancient, wet environments. As the rover travels farther down the slope, it will be able to examine increasingly older rocks in the exposed walls of the crater.

"While we take seriously the uncertainty about whether Opportunity will climb back out, the potential value of investigations that appear possible inside the crater convinced me to authorize the team to move forward into Victoria Crater," said Alan Stern, NASA associate administrator, Science Mission Directorate, NASA

Headquarters, Washington. "It is a calculated risk worth taking, particularly because this mission has far exceeded its original goals."

The robotic geologist will enter Victoria Crater through an alcove named Duck Bay. The eroding crater has a scalloped rim of cliff-like promontories, or capes, alternating with more gently sloped alcoves, or bays.

A meteor impact millions of years ago excavated Victoria, which lies approximately 4 miles south of where Opportunity landed in January 2004. The impact-created bowl is half a mile across and about five times as wide as Endurance Crater, where Opportunity spent more than six months exploring in 2004.

The rover began the journey to Victoria from Endurance 30 months ago. It reached the rim at Duck Bay nine months ago. Opportunity then drove approximately a quarter of the way clockwise around the rim, examining rock layers visible in the promontories and possible entry routes in the alcoves. Now, the rover has returned to the most favorable entry point.

"Duck Bay looks like the best candidate for entry," said John Callas, rover project manager, NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Pasadena, Calif. "It has slopes of 15 to 20 degrees and exposed bedrock for safe driving."

If all of its six wheels continue working, engineers expect Opportunity to be able to climb back out of the crater. However, Opportunity's twin rover Spirit lost the use of one wheel more than a year ago, diminishing its climbing ability.

"These rovers are well past their design lifetimes, and another wheel could fail on either rover at any time," Callas said. "If Opportunity were to lose the use of a wheel inside Victoria Crater, it would make it very difficult, perhaps impossible, to climb back out."

"We don't want this to be a one-way trip," said Steve Squyres, principal investiga-

tor for the rovers' science instruments, Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y. "We still have some excellent science targets out on the plains that we would like to visit after Victoria. But if Opportunity becomes trapped there, it will be worth the knowledge gained."
