Fellow Members of STARFLEET:

The CPA has released to us the results of the Commander, STARFLEET election and the four constitutional amendments. 3538 ballots were mailed, and 1087 were returned. There were 4 cards that had duplicate serial numbers, so the total of cards counted was 1,083, for a response rate of 30.61%.

The election results:

COMMANDER, STARFLEET Lizard / Halverson: 532 Ueffing / Halber: 233 Plant / Devine: 162 Olson/Berenberg: 144

Total: 1,083

Sal Lizard and Gary Halverson are declared the winners and will take office as Commander, STARFLEET and Vice Commander, STARFLEET on January 1, 2008 for a three year term.

Constitutional Ammendment 0701:

Yes: 823 No: 234 Abstain: 26

This amendment is declared ratified, and goes into effect immediately.

Constitutional Ammendment 0702:

Yes: 840 No: 217 Abstain: 26

This amendment is declared ratified and goes into effect immediately.

Constitutional Ammendment 0703:

Yes: 932 No: 123 Abstain: 28

This ammendment is declared ratified and goes into effect immediately.

Constitutional Ammendment 0704:

Yes: 857 No: 200 Abstain: 26

This ammendment is declared ratified and goes into effect immediately.

VCS - Among other things, the VCS department is busy working on edits to the Membership Handbook to include the new resolutions that you voted on during the election and to correct other mistakes that were noted during the review. The updated version will be presented to the AB for review and approval shortly.

Gary and Mark communicated regularly and completed their transition prior to January 1st.

Operations - Ops has already kicked out their first Vessel Registry. Through thier Chapter Care program, they are working to help re-establish R20 members and chapters.

Mike and Gumby worked together to ensure a smooth and timely transition of the Operations department.

Communications - Communications is on track to get their first CQ (the Feb/Mar edition) in the mail by early February.

Dixie Halber has yet to send Peter the Communications materials and printer despite several indications that she was ready to ship.

Academy - The Academy continues to perform without interruption. There was a brief interruption of services when CompOps was adjusting database permissions but it was fixed fairly quickly.

Wayne remained on staff in the Academy and the transition to Peg went very smoothly.

Shakedown Operations - Warren has contacted all of the "Chapters in Training" to introduce himself and provide his contact information. He also took the opportunity to convey his personal "congrats" to all for filing their MSRs ontime.

As many know, I have started a blog at Warren and Jerry still work together so

their transition happened early in the transition period so that Warren was ready to go before January 1st.

Computer Operations - Besides the arduous task of making database permission, email addy and operational list adjustments during his first days in office, CompOps has also fixed the database certificate issue.

Matt was contacted by Larry Barnes who turned over the access to the website. mail and database hosting but has yet to be contacted by Susan. Matt was contacted by Joost a little over a week ago to offer any help he could. Matt responded that he really would like to talk to Susan for some CompOps guidance/clarification but has not received any other communication. Matt has pretty much had to learn on his own with some limited help from me.

Matt is also awaiting the turnover of the Membership Processing Supplies from Chrissy. Chrissy had previously indicated that she would get the shipping information from Liz while she was out in California at the end of the year but that meeting never happened. As I understand it, Chrissy did get the shipper info from the CFO's office the other day and should be shipping it shortly.

Financial Operations - The CFO's office is working to file for the proper licenses and tax documents for STARFLEET's operations. So far we have the tax id numbers for Texas and Alabama. They are preparing to file for a New York tax id number to cover the upcomming International Conference to be held in Ithaca and QM sales in that state, and a Florida tax id number for Linda Olsen's Marine Quartermaster sales. Pat Spillers has compiled the past QM sales in Texas and has determined that our tax should be a little over \$400 + anywhere up to another 60% penalty for not filing in time to take advantage of the state's amnesty opportunity. The only thing holding up the resolution of the sales tax issue in Texas is the lack of a check to pay the tax which

role on the third season of 24.


In a recent interview, Quinto remarked that his dream role would be the young Spock in a Star Trek movie. Looks like his dream has come true!

## Asteroid renamed for Star Trek actor

NEW YORK (AP) 10-03-07

A piece of outer space named for George Takei is in kind of a rough neighborhood for somebody who steers a starship: an asteroid belt.

An asteroid between Mars and Jupiter has been renamed 7307 Takei in honor of the actor, best known for his role as Hikaru Sulu in the original Star Trek series and movies.

"I am now a heavenly body," Takei, 70, said Tuesday, laughing. "I found out about it yesterday. ... I was blown away. It came out of the clear, blue sky - just like an asteroid."

The celestial rock, discovered by two Japanese astronomers in 1994, was formerly known as 1994 GT9. It joins the 4659 Roddenberry (named for the show's creator, Gene Roddenberry) and the 68410 Nichols (for co-star Nichelle Nichols, who played Lt. Uhura). Other main-belt asteroids have been named for science fiction luminaries Robert Heinlein and Isaac Asimov.

The renaming of 7307 Takei was approved by the International Astronomical Union's Committee on Small Body Nomenclature. About 14,000 asteroid names have been approved by the panel, while about 165,000 asteroids have been identified and numbered, union spokesman Lars Lindberg Christensen said.

Unlike the myriad Web sites that offer to sell naming rights to stars, the IAU committee-approved names are actually used by astronomers, said Tom Burbine, the Mount Holyoke College astronomy professor who proposed the name swap.

"This is the name that will be used for all eternity," he said.

Burbine said he suggested Takei's name anyone named Luke or

in part out of appreciation for his work Anakin in it, a story path that Lucas conwith the Japanese American Citizens League and with the gay rights group Human Rights Campaign. Takei, a spokesman for HRC's Coming Out Project, was cultural affairs chairman of the JACL, and he was appointed to the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission by former President Clinton.

Takei has appeared on NBC's Heroes and appears regularly on Howard Stern's satellite radio show.

Under the committee's policies, whoever discovers an asteroid has 10 years in which to propose a name. After that, the panel considers other suggestions, although it warns would-be namers to avoid anything "in questionable taste" and any names honoring political or military figures sooner than 100 years after their deaths.

## **GEORGE LUCAS PLANNING** STAR WARS TV SERIES

Attention, TV executives: The Force may soon be with you.

Filmmaker George Lucas said Tuesday that he has "just begun work" on a live-action television series rooted in the "Star Wars" universe, which is huge news not just for fans of the science-fiction epic but also for networks looking for a piece of the Lucas magic that has grossed \$4.3 billion in theaters worldwide.

There is a caveat, though: The proposed series doesn't have

cedes is "taking chances" as far as connecting with an audience expecting the familiar mythology.

"The Skywalkers aren't in it, and it's about minor characters," Lucas said in an interview. "It has nothing to do with Luke Skywalker or Darth Vader or any of those people. It's completely different. But it's a good idea, and it's going to be a lot of fun to do."

Lucas joked that the series would be about "the life of robots" but wouldn't let any details slip about the true premise. The "extended universe" of Star Wars has come to life already in Lucas-sanctioned novels, comics and games that chronicle the history of the Jedi and tell the tales of bit players in the films, such as the bounty hunters from The Empire Strikes Back.

Lucas already has another television series percolating: Lucas Animation has been working for months on Star Wars: The Clone Wars, a computer-animated series that he hopes will introduce a new era of visuals to weekly episodic television. Lucas plans to produce it through his own companies before shopping the finished product to networks.

That model may also be used for the liveaction show, although producer Rick McCallum said Tuesday that it's too early to say. McCallum is interviewing writers

for the live-action series.

Lucas is confident he can find a home for his droids and Jedi, but he also knows the projects are unorthodox enough to give network executives pause.

"They are having a hard time," Lucas said. "They're saying, 'This doesn't fit into our little square boxes,' and I say, 'Well, yeah, but it's Star Wars. And Star Wars doesn't fit into that box."

St. Petersburg in 1989. Victor and Irina Yelchin were both stars with the Leningrad Ice Ballet and had qualified for the 1972 Winter Olympics, but the Soviets did not allow them to participate due to their Jewish religion.

The family settled in Southern California and remained active in ice skating, but young Anton soon took an interest in acting. After appearing in commercials for the likes of McDonald's and Chuck E. Cheese's, he landed the first of many TV guest roles with ER in 2000. From 2004-2006 he appeared on Showtime's original drama Huff as the younger son Byrd to Hank Azaria's conflicted psychiatrist, Dr. Craig Huffstodt. Other TV guest roles include Curb Your Enthusiasm, The Practice, Judging Amy and Without a Trace.

He made his film debut in the independent film "A Man Is Mostly Water" in 2002, then won the Young Artists Award for "Best Lead Performance in A Feature Film" in "Hearts in Atlanta" opposite Anthony Hopkins. His highest-profile role to date may have been that of the Russian ambassador's son in the Morgan Freeman-Ashley Judd thriller "Along Came A

Spider," while more recent work includes co-starring turns with Diane Lane and Donald Sutherland in "Fierce People" and in "Alpha Dog," co-starring Emile Hirsch and Justin Timberlake.

Ben Cross has been cast as Sarek. Cross, a graduate of London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts, rose to international stardom with his breakout role as runner Harold Abrahams in the Academy Award-winning 1981 film "Chariots of Fire." He will be seen in the upcoming "Hero Wanted" with Cuba Gooding, Jr. and

Ray Liotta. Last year he performed with Alexander Siddig in the BBC historical drama about ancient Rome, "Hannibal,"


Oscar-nominated actress Winona Ryder has been cast as "Amanda Grayson." Winona Ryder is one of Hollywood's golden girls of the last two decades, first stealing hearts as a goth teen in her breakout role in Tim Burton's "Beetlejuice." She continued to establish herself as a movie star in "Heathers." "Edward Scissorhands," "Mermaids" and "Bram Stoker's Dracula." She earned an Academy Award nomination two years in a row, 1994 and 1995, first as a supporting actress in "The Age of Innocence" and then as a lead in "Little Women." She went on to play an android in "Alien: Resurrection," and co-starred with Whoopi Goldberg in "Girl, Interrupted."

Australian actor Eric Bana, best known for his role in "Munich," will be playing a new villain called "Nero". Little else is known about this character, but based on Bana's past performances the Aussie will make a fine antagonist.

Production on J.J. Abrams new "Star Trek" movie began in November of '07 at Paramount, with a release date of Christmas Day 2008.

## NASA Launches Asteroid Mission

Α C Ρ Ε CANAVERAL. Fla. - NASA's Dawn spacecraft rocketed away Thursday, September 27, 2007 toward an unprecedented double encounter in the asteroid belt. Scientists hope the mission sheds light on the early solar system by exploring the two



largest bodies in the belt between Mars and Jupiter: an asteroid named Vesta and a dwarf planet the size of Texas named Ceres.

Dawn's mission is the world's first attempt to journey to a celestial body and orbit it, then travel to another and circle it as well. lon-propulsion engines, once confined to science fiction, are making it possible.

"To me, this feels like the first real interplanetary spaceship," said Marc Rayman, chief engineer. "This is the first time we've really had the capability to go someplace, stop, take a detailed look, spend our time there and then leave."

The 3 billion-mile trip began a little after sunrise. The Delta II rocket thundered through a clear blue sky and headed southeast above the thick clouds over the horizon. A harvest moon was faintly visible in the west.

"Dawn, you're on your way. Good luck," Launch Control said once Dawn separated from its third rocket stage an hour later, right on cue. Already, the spacecraft was 4,000 miles from Earth.

*Dawn* won't reach Vesta, its first stop, until 2011, and Ceres, its second and last stop, until 2015.

Scientists chose the two targets not only because of their size but because they are so different from one another.

Vesta, an asteroid about the length of Arizona and not quite spherical, is dry and rocky and appears to have a surface of frozen lava. It's where many of the meteorites found on Earth came from. Ceres, upgraded to a dwarf planet just last year, is nearly spherical, icy and may have frost-covered poles. Both formed around the same time some 4 1/2 billion years ago.

Spacecraft have flown by asteroids before — albeit much smaller — and even orbited and landed on them, and more asteroid missions are on the horizon. But none has attempted to orbit two on the same mission, until *Dawn*.

"While these other asteroid missions are, I think, very exciting, I hope one doesn't confuse the kind of asteroids that *Dawn* is going to with the near-Earth asteroids and these other small bodies," said Rayman, who is based at Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif. "I think many people think of asteroids as kind of little chips of rock. But the places that *Dawn* is going to really are more like worlds."

Dawn has cameras, an infrared spectrometer and a gamma ray and neutron detector to probe the surfaces of Vesta and Ceres from orbit. It also has solar wings that measure nearly 65 feet from tip to tip, to generate power as it ventures farther from the sun.

Most importantly, *Dawn* has three ion engines that will provide a gentle yet increasingly accelerating thrust. Electrons will bombard *Dawn's* modest supply of xenon gas, and the resulting ions will shoot out into space, nudging the spacecraft along.

Even *Star Wars* had only twin ion engines with its T.I.E. Fighters, Rayman noted with a smile earlier in the week.

The mission costs \$357 million, excluding the unpublicized price of the rocket.

# Japan lunar probe reaches orbit

TOKYO - Japan has placed a satellite in orbit around the moon for the first time, officials said Friday, in a major space breakthrough for the Asian nation.

The \$279 million Selenological and Engineering Explorer — or SELENE — is the largest lunar mission since the U.S. Apollo program in terms of overall scope and ambition.

The mission involves placing the main satellite in orbit at an altitude of about 60 miles and deploying two smaller satellites in polar orbits, according to the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency, or JAXA.

Researchers will use data gathered by the probes to study the moon's origin and evolution. The main orbiter will stay in position for about a year.

Japan launched a moon probe in 1990, but that was a flyby mission. It canceled another moon shot, LUNAR-A, that was to have been launched in 2004 but had been repeatedly postponed because of mechanical and fiscal problems.

The long-delayed SELENE was launched on Sept. 14 aboard one of the space program's mainstay H-2A rockets from Tanegashima, the remote island where the agency's space center is located.

The mission — four years behind JAXA's original schedule — comes as China is planning to launch its own lunar probe. That country's minister of defense and technology told China Central Television in July all was ready for a launch "by the end of the year."

China's Chang'e 1 orbiter will use stereo cameras and X-ray spectrometers to map three-dimensional images of the lunar surface and study its dust.

## NASA Begins Hunt for New Astronauts

The U.S. space agency announced Tuesday that it is accepting applications for its 2009 Astronaut Candidate Class. Would-be spaceflyers have until July 1, 2008 to apply, the agency said.

"They would begin duty at the Johnson Space Center in August 2009," NASA spokesperson Katherine Trinidad told SPACE.com of the new astronauts. Based in Houston, Texas, the Johnson Space Center (JSC) is home to NASA's space shuttle and ISS mission controls, as well as its astronaut corps.

After completing basic training, members of the 2009 astronaut class could go on

to fly long-duration flights to the ISS or to the agency's first lunar flights aboard NASA's future Orion Crew Exploration Vehicles, NASA officials said.

Trinidad said there are currently 91 active NASA astronauts training for spaceflights or performing technical duties. An additional 15 international spaceflyers are also on active duty, she added.

To be considered for NASA's astronaut corps, applicants must hold a bachelor's degree in engineering, science or mathematics and have three years of relevant professional experience, the space agency said.

While most successful applicants are veteran engineers, scientists or pilots of highperformance jets, NASA also urged educators to apply for its newest class of astronauts. Experienced teachers of kindergarten through the 12th grade level are also considered qualified, NASA officials added.

There are currently four educator astronauts in NASA's spaceflying ranks, the first of whom — former Idaho schoolteacher Barbara Morgan — completed her first spaceflight last month aboard the space shuttle Endeavour. Morgan participated in ISS construction during NASA's STS-118 mission in August and served as backup

Teacher in Space Christa McAuliffe 🗑 before the 1986 Challenger accident.

NASA will announce the final selections for the new astronaut class in early 2009 after a six-month interview and evaluation process.

"We look forward to gathering applications and then being able to select from the largest pool possible," said veteran astronaut Ellen Ochoa, NASA's chief of flight crew operations at JSC, in a statement.

The 2009 astronaut candidates will be NASA's first new space-bound class since 2004, when 11 new spaceflyers joined the U.S. space agency. Included in the 2004 group were three educator astronauts. A trio of spaceflyers from the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA) also trained alongside the 2004 class.
