As mentioned at Summit, I am one of the Admiralty Board Members who volunteered and is assigned to the STARFLEET Bylaws (a/k/a our "Constitution") Committee, charged with submitting suggestions to Fleet's attorneys for have a complete re-write of the Bylaws. A revision to the Bylaws definitely has been needed for a long, long time. I have been so confused when I read our Membership Handbook that it made my head hurt. It was explained to us that when it was written, several authors were charged with writing certain sections and then just stuck those sections together without thinking that maybe someone wrote something contradictory to the other. Therefore, we've been stuck with a badly written document all these years. We're going to fix it. After we make the suggestions to the attorneys, they will come back with a document and we'll discuss and revise until it's the way the committee wants. Then, the Committee will begin writing the Membership Handbook. It is our hope that this will all be done by next summer, in time for the STARFLEET Elections, so all members will then vote on the new Bylaws (aka Constitution).

One of us will be glad to review it, and pass it along for discussion.

ECAB and Admiralty Board discussions are ongoing and constant as well. If you wish to see any AB Resolutions for this year, please review them at the website: http://historian.sfi.org/AB/#2009. Recently, the AB is discussing some Membership Handbook revisions regarding the Shakedown Operations Command ("ShOC") and some revisions adding special memberships, like for political situations such as those from Cuba, who we are barred from having transactions involving money so we're discussing the possibility of an electronic membership for them. I have sent both of these suggestions to the Region 3 CCO for their input as well, so if you have any questions, you can ask your CO or me.Due to the fact that the AB and ECAB have been very active and that I'm on the Bylaws Committee, I have had a very busy first 4 months. I'm working hard to try to keep up, so if I owe you an email, maybe send it to me again, because I might have missed it. Or, if you have my number, please call me. Your email may have been lost in the thousands I now get being your RC. I am, however, looking forward to the next several months and even year. I've been enjoying being your RC and happy and thankful that you voted for me to represent you.

Overseas Coupon Program-Keep on Clipping! FCPT Kris Dobie, USS Joan of Arc

Long, long ago & in a country far, far away a certain chaplain and her husband saw a desperate need in the ranks of the lower enlisted service men. Those families simply couldn't make ends meet on a monthly basis. They had the problems of most new families: too much month and not enough money...Help was on the way!!! After many discussions; much thought; and research, the Reverend Beck Thane and her husband began to quietly send their expired personal manufacturers coupons back to their former base overseas in Germany. This was the birth of the OCP---Overseas Coupon Project. In a modified form, this same project continues today almost 17+ years after its inception.

The program started with one ship, the USS Infinity, and very soon thereafter began building momentum. Everyone wanted to be part of such a worthwhile project. As the project progressed, the number of participants came from all works of life. There were social clubs, church clubs, families, individuals, & so many from fleet that the ships had to be listed in alphabetical order!

Just think it ALL started with one ship here in REGION3!!!

Becky Thane stepped down from the daily operation in June 2000 but she had a successor in Eddie Allen to take over the reins. At that time and to this day, OCP is a strictly volunteer program that gets only the time from its loyal staff with no funding at all. Donations get recorded on the site as 'real life' allows which is why it takes awhile to see your ship's ranking change. After Eddie resumed OCP operations, it looked like the program was again on its way up...Indeed the coupon total from just the Fleet chapters in 2005 was more than the grand total in 2003.

Family& individual coupon totals were up also. Recently, the program has been experiencing a falling off of Fleet ships contributing coupons... 2006's rooster showed 25 ships listed on the Fleet Chart with 4 of them from Region 3. The downslide continued into 2007 with 22 ships involved and dropping to two ships from Region 3. Ships were still listed in order of how many dollars of coupons they had donated. 18 ships was the total number of actively participating ships in '08, Region 3 continued to have 2 in this list. It was the first year that there wasn't a separate Fleet chart for donations...

The largest drop in number of ships came in 2009. There were 8 all total with 1/4th of them being from Region 3. Those ships were/are the USS Joan of Arc & the USS Aurora Vulcanus. For a more detailed/complete history of the OCP and individual ship's ranking, please go to the OCP site at www.ocpnet.org.

The Joan of Arc has bee involved with this program since records have been kept, about 1998. It has been the focus of the Science Dept. as our long distance service goal for many years. The club has collected \$13,412.53 dollars worth of coupons up to 2002. This was only the beginning as the 'Lady J' began to rise in the ranks of coupon donations. We started off 2005 in 19th place in Fleet & 4th place in Region3. 2006 was to be a banner year for the club. We ended in 9th place Fleet-wide & 2nd in Region 3.

This was the summer that we challenged the USS Victory (out of S.A.) to a 90-day coupon collection period. The premise was to see which ship could collect; process (cut, sort, & count food & non-food), then record the most dollar amount of coupons in the given time period. The victors were 'allowed ' 5 free shots from full water guns during the water wars at the summer BBQ at Tahnya Abbott's home. Happily, the Joan rose to the occasion with a grand total of \$8,053.78 dollars as opposed to \$2,688.50 dollars for the Victory. After getting TOTALLY DRENCHED the CO & XO formally presented their coupons to be added to the Joan's & sent to our base in Japan. Everybody wins in a scenario like that; the program, the overseas base & both clubs. The final Total here was \$ 10,742.30dollars WOW!

Collections dropped slightly in 2007 on the Fleet level but we climbed to 2nd in Region 3. The USS Aurora Vulcan us was only ONE rank above us. As previously stated in the OCP history section, Ships weren't ranked in 2008 just listed in ABC order with the other organizations. The Joan continued her rise in the donation standings. At the end of '08 the 'Lady J' had moved into 10th place in Fleet standings plus remaining in second in Region 3. The A.V. passing us by a slim margin.

So far in 2009, only 8 ships have been recorded in the OCP database since March 01,'09. The USS Aurora Vulcanus is STILL among the 8 participating ships, coming in at 4th place Fleet-wide while the USS Joan of Arc has donated \$8,125.85 dollars is currently waiting for the data base to catch up. This will put the Joan in First place in both Fleet & Region3 records at the current record count. Hooray for the "Lady J" She is truly legendary.

P.S. A follow up box of \$4,833.18 dollars was sent on Aug 13,'09. This brought the Joan's yearly total to \$12,959.03. Truly, LEGENDS ENDURE!!!!!

Tanke Take on Trek 2LT Tank Clark, USS Regulator

"Return of the Archons"

The Original Series, Season 1, Episode 21 Before we begin, I'd like to explain my method of episode selection for this series. Although I'm a lifelong Star Trek fan, I own no copies of the live-action episodes. I recently purchased the Animated Series on VD, but other than that and the Star Trek Movie Trilogy boxed set released not long ago (Wrath of Khan, Search for Spock, and The Voyage Home) I don't yet own any Trek DVDs. I still have my VCR tapes of the first eight movies...I never bought Nemesis, or, as I like to call it, "Attack of the Clone." I have my TiVo set up to record any Star Trek series that comes on, and I usually have a choice between episodes of Enterprise, Voyager, and - once a week of so – an episode of the original series. This episode most recently aired on TV Land on 4 Oct 2009.

The Enterprise visits Beta III to try to find out what happened to the spaceship Archon, which went missing a century ago. Lieutenants Sulu and O'Neil beam down, but are quickly found out by the locals as being "Archons" and are chased by brown robed dudes called "Lawgivers." It turns out that the landing party was given out-of-style clothes, as the natives are dressed in 1880's styles clothing rather than the 1780's clothing Sulu & O'Neil were wearing. Anyway, Sulu calls Enterprise to get beamed up. O'Neil panics & runs off, and a Lawgiver zaps Sulu just before he gets transported up. When Lt. Sulu arrives on Enterprise, he's weird: he doesn't seem to recognize anyone, he keeps babbling about Landru and the Body, and so forth.

Capt. Kirk therefore sends another landing party down, this one made up of himself, Spock, McCoy, Mr. Lindstrom (a sociologist) and a security guard. As a security type, this sort of thing really annoys me...let's send the CO, XO, and the CMO into a very dangerous area with only a few people to protect them from unfriendly people. Grr. The party arrives just in time for Festival, a time when the normally peaceful and clam natives go on a twelve hour spree of vandalism and violence. Kirk & company take refuge at Reger's place, even while Reger's daughter Tula participates in Festival. Interestingly, the tailors on Enterprise have learned their lesson about bad costuming. Kirk's suit jacket, although it looks like he might have borrowed it from the Joker, even has a label on the inside pocket.

A native turns the Enterprise landing party in to the Lawgivers (because of their strange behavior, not participating in Festival and all), who show up & kill one of the other natives ("Tamar"). The Lawgivers want to take our heroes captive, but Kirk refuses & the Lawgivers don't know how to respond. They start "communing" with Landru. The sound that this makes sounds just like a tricorder, which I suppose is convenient. Meanwhile, Reger takes our heroes to a safe house, and on the way there, they find Mr. O'Neil, who has been "Absorbed" into "the Body" which of course means he works for Landru now. Kirk takes O'Neil anyway, and rather than having him beamed up the ship (where I suppose he & Sulu could share a nice quiet room) he has him taken into the safe house. This gives Landru the ability to find the landing party: Landru sends a holographic projection to lecture them, then zaps 'em with a sonic weapon to knock 'em out. When we come back from commercial, most of our heroes are in a dungeon awaiting Absorption; McCoy and a red shirt are getting the treatment.

Lucky for Kirk & Spock, the guy running the Absorption machine is relieved by the third member of Reger & Tamar's resistance cell, Marplon. Marplon returns their phasers and communicators, and tells them to act like they'd been Absorbed. Kirk checks in with Enterprise, an discovers the ship is under attack by heat beams, and has only a few hours left before her shields fail & they fall out of orbit into the atmosphere. Meanwhile, Spock has concluded that Landru, who has been running the planet for some six thousand years, is a computer. Oddly enough, the remaining landing party member is never sent to the Absorption Chamber, and nobody seems to care. I guess sometimes it's good to be a minor character.

Kirk and Spock then overcome two Lawmakers and borrow their robes & staffs. Marplon takes them to Landru's audience chamber, where they ignore Landru's projected image (by the way, it looks like Landru got his hair cut at the same place that Flock of Seagulls did), blast a hole in the wall, and check out the computer who calls itself Landru. Landru disables their phasers, so Kirk has to talk the computer into destroying itself. Kirk's good at this sort of thing: remember Nomad? Remember M-5? When Landru stops controlling everyone, two Lawmakers rush in asking for Landru to guide them. Kirk aims his phaser at the pair, but Spick stops him from shooting. I'm not sure why...after all, the phasers were disabled by Landru less than five minutes earlier. Anyway, Kirk finishes talking Landru into suicide, thereby ending the only known way of life to the last 6,000 years on Beta III. Before leaving orbit, Kirk is kind enough to leave Sociologist Lindstrom and a team of scientist behind to help "rehabilitate" the planet.

I've always been surprised Kirk wasn't cashiered for his blatant disregard of the Prime Directive. Spock commented that destroying Landru would upset Beta III's culture, but Kirk stated the Prime Directive only applied to "a living, growing culture." I guess Starfleet agreed with Kirk, but I would have loved to see Beta III revisited, perhaps by Captain Sulu and the Excelsior, or maybe by Enterprise-D's crew.
